Perryville, Arkansas, where they served as hosts to groups,

sharing how to impact the hunger of the world and to share peace.

Caby was a lifelong athlete. Football was his favorite sport from high school days,

where he also ran track. He was an accomplished marathon runner. His devotion to

football led to him being a referee. His love for the MSU bulldogs was legendary and of

course his favorite colors were maroon and white. Photography was a favorite hobby throughout his life.
